Year 7 - 10 Social 2023

The Year 7-10 Social is a Marian College tradition that has been going on for many years. The 2023 event will be held at the Ararat Town Hall on Tuesday 24th October from 7pm to 10 pm.

Expectations

We need parents to be discussing the expectations for this event with their child. As students will have already been practising their social dances in their wellbeing classes in preparation for this event, it is important to understand the need for all students to show respect for each other at all times. Students will be dancing the Pride of Erin, Barn Dance and Jive, among others, which will require students to hold hands and dance in a 'ballroom hold'. We must stress that this is a respectful, confident hold to help both dancers maintain the distance between them, especially when turning. This is important to ensure that they do not step on each other's feet! All dances are progressive, meaning that all girls and boys will dance with each other at one point or another during the night.

Throughout the evening, each year level will showcase their 'presentation dance' and there will be awards and prizes for Best Dancers/Partners and best dressed for the girls and boys in each year level.

There is no expectation for parents to spend a lot of money on new outfits for the child. Students should dress in an appropriate and modest smart casual or semi-formal attire. For boys this generally means a button up shirt, pants and closed toe shoes. A tie or jacket is not compulsory. For girls this generally means either a dress, long pant one-piece, dress pants and a nice shirt etc. Considering there will be dancing involved, it is recommended that high heels are avoided. A small heel would be suitable but students need to consider what they will be most comfortable wearing on the dance floor. Please no denim, no thongs, no birks and no slides.

The Year 10 students will be dressing to a theme that they have chosen, which for this year is 'Spotify', and will make a grand entrance to the hall. There will be a 'catwalk' to parade their costumes.

It is an exciting night out for all students and they must be reminded that they will be sharing the space with a possible 300+ other students and teachers. It is important that they behave in a safe and appropriate manner at all times. There will be no passouts, so once students arrive they will not be permitted to leave. Please make sure that you are at the Town Hall promptly at 10pm to pick up your child from the Social.

There will be a bus to and from the Social for Stawell students. This will be leaving St. Patrick's Primary School at 6:30pm sharp, and returning at approximately 10:30pm. (Please note bus times to be confirmed)

Finger foods (including hot and cold food items) and water will be served between dances. The event is supervised by Marian College Teachers. In case of emergency, please contact the school mobile - 0427 420468 on the night.

Please make sure that your child arrives on time. The lock-out time is 7:30pm. Doors will re-open at 9:45 pm. We ask that students don't bring bags. There will be a cloak room for them to keep phones or other valuables in if they need.



2023 and 2024 VCE English







Initial Teacher Education Courses

Victoria

To be eligible for initial teacher education courses in Victoria, you will need to do the following:

- Meet academic admission requirements, including a minimum ATAR and course prerequisites.
- Complete and pass a test designed to assess your suitability to be a teacher (measures personal competencies such as ethics, empathy, and communication skills).

Test options include:

Casper test

Sit this test to be eligible for all Victorian universities, https://takealtus.com/

Australian Catholic University (ACU) Students applying to ACU in Victoria for initial teacher education courses can complete the free ACU Teacher Selector Statement. This is can only be used for entry into ACU initial teacher education courses. It can be used as an alternative to the Casper test, or in addition to it, https://bit.ly/3rAvGTq

Monash University

Has just introduced the Monash Teaching Suitability Test. This is a free online test and can only be used for entry into Monash initial teacher education courses. It can be used as an alternative to the Casper test, or in addition to it, https://bit.ly/3tgzrhl

La Trobe University

Will soon launch the La Trobe University's Aptitude for Teaching Assessment (AFTA). This is a free online test and can only be used for entry into La Trobe initial teacher education courses. It can be used as an alternative to the Casper test, or in addition to it. Information will be released soon.



NSW/AC1

To be eligible for initial teacher education courses in NSW/ACT, you will need to:

- Meet academic admission requirements, including a minimum ATAR and course prerequisites.
- Complete the Teaching Questionnaire in your UAC account or a motivation to teach questionnaire direct to the university.

Additional forms, tests, auditions etc.

You may need to complete additional tasks or tests to be eligible for selection into your dream courses (e.g., performing arts, fine art). Double check the selection requirements for the courses you're applying for.

ELITE ATHLETE ENTRY SCHEMES

Are you an elite athlete? Did you know that you may be eligible for a range of benefits as an elite athlete at university or TAFE? This could include:

- ATAR adjustments towards your selection rank for entry into courses.
- Academic planning advice and course flexibility.
- Negotiation of assessment deadlines and attendance at lectures and tutorials
- Support with special consideration, exam relocation, and studying classes at other universities or online if you're travelling for training or competitions.

The Elite Athlete Education Network (EAEN) provides 'a network of Australian Institute of Sport endorsed providers in the areas of higher education where athletes can learn and equip themselves with qualifications, knowledge and skills for future careers beyond their sport.'

Applicants must be recognised an organisation by such as:

Australian Institute of Sport, state institutes or academies of sport, AFL Players Association, Australian Cricketers Association, Australian Professional Footballers Association, and national Squad members from Sport Australia funded sports. Note – some universities recognise emerging athletes from eligible organisations.

SCHOLARSHIPS

For most universities in Victoria, NSW and Canberra, a dual system exists for scholarship applications. This means institutions place some of their scholarships through the state based Tertiary Admission Centre (TAC) system and others direct through the university.

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR ME?

This means you will have to:

Complete the TAC scholarship application and upload any evidence required.

Victoria: apply via VTAC by this Friday (6 October), www.vtac.edu.au

NSW/ACT: apply via UAC by Friday 8 December, www.uac.edu.au

Apply for any scholarships you are eligible for direct to the university.

This will take time and effort, but it's worth it as you may receive a scholarship or bursary.

VICTORIAN INSTITUTES

What universities don't place scholarships through the VTAC scholarships system?

- The University of Melbourne: apply for all scholarships direct.
- Australian Catholic University: apply for equity scholarships via the UAC system by 8 December as well as direct to the university by the relevant due dates, www.acu.edu.au
- Monash University: apply for scholarships via the VTAC SEAS system.

Important to note

Closing dates vary between institutes for direct scholarships and some scholarships close early. For example, many direct scholarships to RMIT University close in October.

NSW & ACT COURSES

If you have applied to the university directly and not via UAC, contact the institute to confirm if you have to complete a UAC Equity Scholarship application. For most institutes, regardless of the application method, you will still need to complete a UAC Equity Scholarship application as well as apply direct to the university for scholarships.

ACCOMMODATION

If you plan move away to study your course, you may need to consider accommodation options. If you would like to live on-campus, you will need to start considering your options now assome universities are 'first in, first served'.

STEPS TO APPLY FOR ON-CAMPUS ACCOMMODATION

- Make an Excel sheet or table in Word.
- List the universities you are applying to.
- Google the university name and the term'accommodation' (e.g., Monash University accommodation).
- In your table, list the types of accommodation available (e.g., studio, shared apartment, catered, non-catered).
- Then list the weekly or yearly price for eachoption and the contract period.
- List the application method, the closing date, cost to apply and if a deposit is required.
- Speak to your family about budgetconsiderations.
- Then tick off the accommodation you haveapplied for once this is completed.

CRITICAL CONSIDERATIONS

Private student housing

Some universities are affiliated with private student accommodation companies such as UniLodge, Scape, and Yugo. Whilst you will generally receive an offer quickly, you will be required to pay a large deposit to secure your place. If you don't end up living there you may not be able to get your deposit back.

Costs can add up if you are applying for accommodation at multiple universities, so budget carefully.

First in first served

Some accommodation providers approve applications in the order they are received, so apply early.

Closing dates

Some accommodation providers will have closing dates – make sure you apply well in advance.

Scholarships

Some accommodation providers offer scholarships, and some have early closing dates for applications.

ALL STUDENTS

TAFE AND POLYTECHNIC APPLICATIONS

Students planning to study at a TAFE or Polytechnic institute next year are encouraged to contact the organisation/s to find out the following:

- When applications open and close
- What the application process entails (e.g., apply direct to the institute or via a Tertiary Admission Centre)
- If there are additional selection requirements such as a portfolio or interview.
- If there is an information session running.
- Back-up courses they should also apply for (e.g., Diploma of Nursing and Certificate III in Individual Support – Aged Care).

Applicants will most likely have to complete a literacy, language, and numeracy test once they apply for the course.

Note: some universities offer TAFE courses. For example -

Federation University Victoria University RMIT University Swinburne University.

Speak to your school Career Adviser to narrow down the best institutes for the study areas you're interested in.

APPRENTICESHIP AND TRAINEESHIP PATHWAYS

Students planning to start a traineeship or apprenticeship next year are advised to start preparing now.

Get specialised support

Register with local Group Training Organisations (GTOs) and Australian Apprenticeship Support Network (AASN) providers. Staff from these organisations are highly skilled and can assist you through all stages of finding, securing, and undertaking an apprenticeship or traineeship. Search for organisations via

Work experience

Speak to your work experience coordinator at school about completing work experience before the end of the school year.

Update your resume and create a cover letter

Work with your career adviser to update your resume and to create a cover letter you can tailor for job applications.

'Cold call' businesses

Why wait for an opportunity to present itself? Send your resume and a tailored cover letter to the businesses you would love to secure a traineeship or apprenticeship at.
