Ms Emily Lindsay and three students went to Melbourne on Thursday 18th and Friday 19th March to participate in a two day Kildare Ministries Social Justice Seminar. The aims of the Seminar were to:

- to deepen understanding of contemporary justice issues and principles of Catholic Social Teaching

- to provide experiences of reflection on the Christian response to systemic causes of justice
- to enable planning for curricular and co-curricular activities back at school
- to afford networking opportunities amongst students from Kildare Ministries
- to enable our senior leaders to develop resources and ideas to enable them to lead their Houses and fellow students in strengthening social justice awareness at Marian College, increase participation of students in activities that support justice issues, and remind us all of the innate dignity of every human person.

This was a wonderful opportunity for our students and they found the experience enlightening.

Last Tuesday after school was an opportunity for TA teachers to provide some feedback to parents and guardians for senior students. It was heartening to hear that so many parents of our senior students took up this chance to speak to the TA teacher about the progress of their child. Whether you had a phone call or a zoom meeting it was wonderful to be able to connect with parents and guardians and provide some feedback on their progress so far.

Year 8 students were able to attend their Retreat last week which was wonderful. The weather was amazing and the feedback from students and staff has been very positive. This was held at Camp Wilkin in Anglesea. The activities that the students participated in were provided by the Youth Mission Team (Melbourne) and students were encouraged to engage with the message of the Gospel in a different way. We had a group of swimmers attend the Greater Western Region Swimming

Carnival on Friday 19th March. This is a great opportunity for our students to compete with students in our region. This week we will have our Year 10 students attending the Road Smart Program. On the 31st of May 2004, my parents, Melissa and Daniel Terry welcomed into the world their first baby girl, naming her Hannah Ruth Terry. Despite the lack of sleep and trauma after my arrival, my parents decided it could only get better from there. They had three more children David, Rachel, and Esther.

I grew up in a loving, Christ-centered household. Until the age of ten, I spent my childhood in the 'booming metropolis' of Launceston, Tasmania. (The two-headed thing is a myth) My childhood was colorful despite the dreary weather. It consisted of a lot of Disney movies (to the point where I can quote entire movies), music and wandering. I am the 'wanderer' of the family - I had to explore everything, see everything. And there may or may not have been many times that I would stand out in the rain, no matter how many

times I would be coerced to get out of it. It is a strange habit that I still do, to this day.

It's no surprise that my hobbies and interests were never one thing. I wanted to see and try anything and everything, to expand my abilities. I even tried out ballet and Highland dancing between books. I even tried out instruments including piano, flute and guitar. I sang everywhere. And I mean everywhere, stores, school choirs, the car, the shower and even in my sleep. My mom introduced me to needlework and knitting. Both my parents taught me how to cook from a young age. I eventually found my passion in art, public speaking, reading, and writing.

Towards the end of my fourth-grade year, my family moved to mainland Australia, to Shepparton, Victoria. A place that is known for the tinned spaghetti, baked beans, and fruit orchards. It was a place where cultures could clash and mingle, it was such a mashup of cultures, it wouldn't matter who you were, you would never go hungry.



With a new outlook on how great life can be I started the next school year in Year 10. I made new friends by using my writing and my voice, to put myself out there. I will never forget the moments of that year. One of them being Retreat because it was the first time, I was able to meet new people with whom I would spend the rest of High School with. Second, during the July break, I went to my hometown (Launceston) to spend two weeks with extended family. I went zip-lining with my Grandpa. Anyone who knows me is aware of my fear of falling from heights, I did it anyway, and if I could face my fears then I could do almost everything. Third, is the 7-10 social. I dressed up as Hermione Granger from 'Harry Potter'. I remember as everyone was getting ready to dance a beach ball came towards me and with a chopstick (makeshift wand) I accidentally POPPED the beach ball. So, to those boys who went as the Beach Boys. I am so very sorry. I have not stopped thinking about it.



So, this is a small part of my crazy life.



In all my twelve years of schooling, I have attended five different schools, I have moved to a new house eight different times and just like I was in my childhood I probably will continue to explore my surroundings.

When I started High School, I began to discover who my people were and who I was. And I was atypical. Always listening to music that was either too old for my generation or in a completely different language or had no words.



There are so many people that I could thank for making an impact, but I am afraid if I wrote all your names it would take more than a few pages. So if you are family, a friend, a classmate, a teacher, an opponent, a role model, a church leader, I am grateful for all that you have done to shape me into who I am.

The following year was an emotional rollercoaster, halfway through the year, our family undertook a new adventure of moving to the Ararat area. During the July school holidays, while I was in the United States visiting family, I was in a quad bike accident, fracturing bones in my face and damaging muscles in my leg. It was a less than perfect start to a new school. For the rest of the year, I was quiet and detached, but my academic achievements didn't go unnoticed.



A special thank you to my parents for having provided me with the opportunity to learn by devoting their lives, patience and time to me.

To the Year 11's - strive to do better than those who have gone before you. You may think some Year 12s are 'scary' but behind the calm and collected façade it's a beautiful mess.



To all the Year 12's - I wish you all the best for what the future holds. Grab every obstacle as an opportunity to do better and be better. I am exceptionally grateful to be alongside so many beautiful, caring, and amazingly talented people.

FROM YOUR HOUSE LEADER

YEAR 8 RETREAT

On Wednesday, the 10th of March, our Year 8 students became the second group from Marian College to attend a retreat camp this year. After a rocky start to the year, with a snap lockdown and cancelled Year 7 camp, there was some trepidation about whether this retreat would be able to take place. Thanks to the planning by Mr East and Mrs Boatman we were all able to head off as scheduled with nearly every Year 8 student and 8 staff members in tow.

Our enthusiastic group was split between two buses for the nearly 3 hour trip to Camp Wilkin at Anglesea. When we arrived we were met by the camp instructors who co-ordinated the activities and the Youth Mission Team, Melbourne, who conducted the retreat sessions. Both groups were fantastic in their efforts to get to know the students and support them over the course of our stay!

After lunch and initial introductions we participated as a whole group in our first retreat session, 'Our Intrinsic Value'. The students were divided into four groups, Kildare, Nagle, Delaney and Bridget, in honour of our Catholic heritage, to then participate in the first of four activities - mountain bike riding, archery tag, high ropes course, and initiatives (team building activities). After a very busy day, each student took advantage of some free time to socialize, explore and enjoy a welcome barbeque. The day wasn't over yet! We were then treated to another retreat session, 'Image of Self', which included a night walk. The sun was just setting as we arrived at the outlook. Millie Richardson reflected, "*[The night walk] was really fun as it was just a great time to talk and muck around a bit...We got to the highest point of the walk at sunset and the view was amazing.*"



When asked about her first day of retreat Regan Price responded, *"Our first activity was Initiatives. We had to work together to do tasks like trying to undo the ropes on our hands, and to get the ball into the bucket using pieces of pipe. It was really hard but also really fun! On the first night, we had so much fun!"* After such a full day, staff and students were able to get some much-needed sleep.

Our second day of camp was non-stop with a retreat session, 'Loving and Accepting Others', to start the day and three rounds of activities. Jack Kuchel expressed it best with his exclamation, *"If you don't have fun at this camp, then you are completely boring, as there was plenty to do, everywhere that you go".*

It was exciting to see the students support each other and overcome their fears at the high ropes course. The teamwork that was required for the initiatives was inspiring. We have some natural leaders who were able to solve each problem they were faced with and others who could easily follow the instructions while encouraging others to do the same. Mountain biking provided a lovely chance for the students to slow down enough to explore the area and take a moment to bask in wonder at the amazing world we live in. Archery tag allowed a few hidden talents to be unleashed, for staff and students alike. The day finished with our fourth retreat session, 'Jesus an Intimate Friend'. By the end of the day, nearly everyone was ready to get some sleep and prepare for their last day of the retreat.

Friday started with an early breakfast and preparation for our 12:00 pm departure. After packing up, we were privileged to have two more retreat sessions with the amazing YMT - 'The Power of Affirmation' and 'My Plan/God's Plan'.

This year's retreat was a beautiful mix of self-discovery, peer support, reflection and wonder. What a privilege it was to spend three days with our spectacular Year 8s!

THE WAY OF THE CROSS 2021



The Stations of the Cross depict the final hours (the Passion) of Jesus' life from his condemnation, to his crucifixion and death on the cross and finally his burial. These events are remembered and reflected upon over Lent and Holy Week before the celebration of the Resurrection (Easter Sunday).

Our school celebration of the Stations of the Cross follows a tradition that is thousands of years old and is an integral part of Marian's religious identity.

At Marian, we believe that our practice of Stations

- Celebrates and promotes our Catholic Identity
- Provides an opportunity for the wider community to see Catholic Education in action
- Is, for many of our students, their only connection to the traditional Easter Story.

This year the Year 12 cohort has elected to present this retelling at the Ararat Astor Cinema on Thursday 1st April. To accommodate the large number of students and to ensure that it remains a solemn occasion we will run sessions for each Year Level.

Due to COVID restrictions Marian College is unable to invite members of the public to our Way of the Cross celebration. We hope to be able to provide a video link to families.

2021 LIONS YOUTH OF THE YEAR - DISTRICT FINALS

Gabriel Tonks represented both Marian College and the Ararat Lions Club in the Zone finals of the Lions Youth of the Year competition in Mortlake on Sunday 14th March. Not one to shy away from a challenge, Gabriel completed a triathlon in the morning, before arriving at Mortlake College in full school uniform at midday, ready for the rigours of this competition.

Gabriel competed against students from Beaufort Secondary College and Mercy Regional College, Camperdown. The students participated in a forty minute interview with the adjudicators in which they discussed general knowledge, current issues, school and community involvement and future ambitions prior.

Following the interviews, the students participated in the impromptu speeches, demonstrating their agile thinking.
