THE WAY OF THE CROSS 2020 MARIAN COLLEGE

The Stations of the Cross depict the final hours (the Passion) of Jesus' life from his condemnation, to his crucifixion and death on the cross and finally his burial. These events are remembered and reflected upon over Lent and Holy Week before the celebration of the Resurrection (Easter Sunday).

EDUCATING FOR JUSTICE STUDENT SEMINAR 2020

Three of our Year 12 Student Leaders and two of our Year nine Justice and Democracy students attended the Educating for Justice Student Seminar at Amberley last week. We met with students from the other Kildare Ministries schools across the country to engage in workshops and activities, attend guest speakers, and plan justice-related initiatives for our school.

Students collaborated in mixed groups and applied their new learning to ask questions, form ideas, and plan. Students pick issues of justice that are important to them, and look at how acts of charity and acts of justice can work to uphold human dignity locally, across Australia, and around the world. Guest speakers included BASP's (Brigidine Asylum Seekers Project) Brigid Arthur (BASP is one of our KM Community Works), Caritas Australia's Gwen Michener, and Rita Khan from Wellsprings for Women (another KM Community Work). We focused on the themes of our Living Justice Charter throughout the seminar.

Our students have returned with energy and passion and enough ideas for the next few years, as well as new friends and connections across the other schools!

PROJECT COMPASSION

PHANY FROM CAMBODIA

Twenty-seven-year-old Phany, lives in a village in western Cambodia. Struggling to earn a living as a rice farmer, she was forced to leave her daughter behind in the village, to take up construction work in the city.

Then in 2016, Phany joined a Caritas supported program, learning more productive farming and irrigation techniques. Her community learned to work together for better water management, to combat drought.

Over 70 percent of Cambodia's population live in rural communities – and the farming families living in poverty are the most food insecure. Thirteen percent of Cambodians live below the poverty line, while 35 out of every 1000 babies die due to malnutrition.

In 2016, Phany joined the Upholding Community Dignity Together program, where she learned new farming techniques, such as a drip irrigation system which enabled her to get a better yield from her vegetable crops and to conserve water for drier periods. She also learned how to grow vegetables and raise chickens and ducks. Phany's community also took part in training in health, nutrition, hygiene and disaster preparedness, arming them with better strategies to cope with environmental changes.



With your help, mothers like Phany can continue to uplift their communities and provide food for their families. A brighter future for women, men and their families can start today. Let's Go Further, Together.

"I am proud that I was a farmer who had no skills and now I can earn and improve my living, share my knowledge and also improve solidarity in the family and amongst our neighbours," Phany says. "I live better than before, I'm not as tired. I can earn and live in the village, I don't need to go to city to find job."

STUDIO ART EXCURSION

28 Studio Art students headed off to Ballarat to see the Next Gen Exhibition at the Art Gallery of Ballarat. *Next Gen 2020* showcases the work of students from government, Catholic and Independent schools mainly from Ballarat and its broader region, who have just completed VCE studies in Art, Studio Arts, Design and Technology, Visual Communication and Design and Media. Marian College has been proudly involved in this exhibition for many years and this year Jonah Dickinson from Studio Art was exhibiting. As seen in the visual, Jonah completed a revolving installation work Called -1.

Promoting nurturing and the underlying intrinsic connection to nature and earth, his artwork is a narrative about energy being equal to *mass multiplied by the speed of light, squared*. The physical revolution of the art piece can symbolise the movement of planets, the cycle of life or the orbit of electrons in an atom but most importantly growth.

After the next Gen exhibition the students jumped on the train to Melbourne to the National Gallery of Victoria to see the Crossing Lines Exhibition - Jean Michel Basquiat and Keith Haring. As two of the most significant and influential artists of the late Twentieth Century, the exhibition offered new and fascinating insights into their unique visual languages and revealed the many intersections between their lives, practices and ideas. These two bad boys of New York in the 80's were prolific in creating artworks works dealing with issues of race discrimination, politics, sexuality, AIDS, poverty and appropriation.

The excursion was a fantastic day. The students were very inspired and it certainly started some wonderful conversations around the idea of street artists entering gallery spaces, the size and scale of artworks, the found materials you can use to create artworks and the idea of music influencing art making.

HOMEWORK

Keep in mind the very real stress and mental exhaustion that many of these students have at the end of the school day. The social aspect of school leaves them with an **absence of breaks during the school day** and for these students, school is for learning and home is for relaxation and time out. The ASD student needs downtime and that can usually happen at home where there is less pressure to constantly conform.

Be aware that **often homework is completed but not handed in**. This can be due to anxiety that it isn't good enough or the teacher didn't specifically request it and the student didn't automatically hand it in. This is where home and school communication is vital. We recommend that as soon as a student doesn't hand in homework contact the parents that day so it can be actioned immediately.

9 Essential Strategies for Homework

- 1 **Arrange Learning Enrichment** / Tutor / Teacher Assistant to help formulate a homework plan.
- 2 Only give **two good resources** from which to gather information.
- 3 **Use a tutor** (not parents) to help with the homework.
- 4 **Choose which subjects require homework responsibilities**, i.e. if he is good at maths he may not need to revise maths lessons with homework.
- 5 **Find the right time and place** (not straight after school. Give them time to relax, eat and drink e.g. do reader in the morning rather than the afternoon).
- 6 **Keep homework short**, with specific start and stop times.
- 7 **Think quality not quantity**. Choose a few selected questions that cover the most important content or main ideas to support the lesson.
- 8 **Stay involved**. Avoid doing the work for them. Give small rewards after doing a small amount of work or, reading and re-emphasising questions can sometimes help to get the right answer.
- 9 **Parents**: sometimes if you sit at the same table and do your own work it can encourage the child to do theirs.

 Make checklists and prioritise tasks	 Keep a schedule including breaks for food, drink, movement	 Use a visual timer	 Have a set space to work (make sure clean and clear of distractions)
 Teach skills for staying organised and tidy	 Practice strategies for moving on when stuck or make mistakes	 Remove phone and other devices - remind can have in break or once finished	 Teach time management by getting them to guess how long they think a task will take
